We hope you enjoyed the Open House on September 14th. This was a great opportunity to meet your student's teachers. I want to thank everyone for their overwhelming positive comments. We really appreciate everyone's input and know that meeting your teachers helps get the school year off to a great start. Another opportunity to speak to teachers will take place next month. Please mark your calendars for November 9th. That is the date of our TPC-hosted parent conferences. Also, first quarter grades will be sent out toward the end of October. You should expect them in the mail.

On the academic front, we are excited to inform you that Hersey has four National Merit Semi-Finalists and eleven Commended Scholars. This is a tremendous accomplishment. Approximately 1.5 million juniors in some 22,000 high schools took the 2012 Preliminary National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which serves as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, which represents less than 1% of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest scoring entrants in each state. Only 16,000 academically talented students in the nation will now have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 8,300 National Merit Scholarships. Hersey is proud to recognize our Semifinalists: **Catherine Kemp, Claire O'Donnell, Alexander Roznai and Grace Sinopoli.**

In addition, approximately 34,000 high performers were named Commended Scholars throughout the nation and these students are recognized for their exceptional academic promise. Although they will not continue in the 2012 competition for National Merit scholarships, these commended students placed among the top 5% of more than 1.5 million students who entered the 2012 competition. As demonstrated by their outstanding performance, they represent some of the most academically talented students in the country. Hersey salutes our Commended Scholars: **Thomas Cotey, Wesley Crim, Allison DeFrancesco, Michelle Grochocinski, Zavier Henry, Marie Hoeger, Natasha Kalafatis, Tyler Nocita, Christopher Pawlowski, Peter Saunders, and Melanie Zagorski.**

Finally, more than 1,600 Black American high school seniors were designated Semifinalists in this program. These scholastically talented young men and women have an opportunity to continue in the competition for 800 Achievement Scholarship awards. Senior, **Zavier Henry** is one of these distinguished scholars. Hersey congratulates all our National Merit scholars.

I have selected 16 freshmen students to be the newest members of my Principal's Advisory Committee (PAC). Representatives from each class come together approximately four times each year and offer their perspective on how things are going at school and they bring their suggestions for improvement. Over 70 freshmen were nominated by their teachers because they showed leadership potential and a genuine interest in their school. In order to be selected, nominated students must complete an essay that addresses why they would like to be a member of the council. This year's Freshmen PAC students are:



The National Scholastic Press

The National Scholastic Press Association will honor seven advisers who show exceptional dedication to improving journalism programs in their schools at the national JEA/NSPA convention in November. **Janet Levin**, the adviser for The Correspondent, published at John Hersey High School in Arlington Heights, IL, was selected to receive the NSPA Pioneer Award.

Levin was chosen as one of the foremost leaders who commit time outside of job requirements for the betterment of scholastic journalism. "It's inspiring to know that she is being rewarded for reaching out beyond our room to make an impact on so many others," junior Ashley Hawkins said of her adviser.

Levin was recognized and nominated by three past Pioneer award winners, Susan Tantillo, Candace Bowen, and Randy Swikle.

"Those three people are amazing journalism teachers. It's an honor because it's about my whole career," Levin said about the Pioneer status.

Through her leadership she has guided many of her students to receive individual national and state awards as well.

The National Council of Teacher of English Achievement Award in Writing to a Hersey Student

John Hersey High School is proud to announce that senior **Monica Burckhardt** has been named a recipient of The National Council of Teacher of English (NCTE)



Achievement Award in Writing. The Achievement Awards in Writing program was established in 1957 to encourage high school students in their writing and to recognize publicly the best student writers in the nation. Assessments of student writing are based on student's samples of their own best prose or verse and on impromptu themes that are written under supervision. A team of English teachers judges the writing, looking especially for writing that demonstrates effective and imaginative use of language to inform and move an audience.

This year, more than 1,600 students from across the United States, Canada, and the Virgin Islands were nominated by their teachers, and Burckhardt was one of 520 chosen for recognition. She was one of approximately 40 Illinois students to achieve this distinction.

College and Career Center News

From the desk of Nancy Davis

The cooler weather returns and leaves begin to fly, signaling a change in the season. At John Hersey High School, autumn is also a time of transition for our students.



- While our **seniors** are busy with their classes and activities, they are also planning for life after Hersey High School. By now most seniors have finalized their college lists and are completing applications. The goal is to finish all college applications by November 15th so that the supplemental materials, such as transcripts, test scores, and recommendations will arrive before their deadlines. Applying even earlier can boost a student's chances for admission or scholarship money. Students who are still deciding where to apply should tour a college campus, attend a college fair, meet with college representatives in the College Career Center, or request a college planning appointment with me.



- **Juniors** will have their first college planning session in October to learn about the college search process. Your junior will be encouraged to visit colleges and meet with admissions representatives in the coming months to begin to identify college characteristics that are important to them. Additionally, we will introduce them to the college search features and research tools in Naviance, a web-based college and career-planning tool. In November, I will be sending a special newsletter to junior parents, laying out a timetable for the college search process and summarizing the information your students receive.



- **Freshmen, sophomores and their parents** are invited to attend a District 214 event titled, "So You want to go to College" Night, on October 13th at 7 p.m. in the Forest View Educational Center Theater. The information will be repeated on November 8th at 7 p.m. in the JHHS Theater. Graduation from high school may seem like it is a long way down the road. However, it is important to know what your student does in the next few years of high school will impact their options after high school. These programs will inform you about when and how students should begin to explore colleges, as well as what to do now to get ready.



College Rep Visits!

College representatives from around the country will be visiting with **juniors** and **seniors** in the College Career Center (CCC) during the next few months. A listing of the dates and times for college visits can be found posted outside the CCC or as a link under the College tab in Naviance. To visit with a college representative, your son or daughter should pick up a pass in the CCC and have their teacher approve the class time they will miss.

Controversial Issues in the Classroom

Township High School District 214's primary mission is to enable all students to learn the skills, acquire the knowledge, and develop the behaviors necessary for them to reach their full potential as citizens who can meet the challenges of a changing society. In a democracy that openly confronts acute and pressing political, social, economic, and moral problems, it is likely that such issues will be evident in classrooms. Discussions about these issues provide students with the type of learning experience that will help prepare them to meet the challenges of a global changing society.

District 214 provides its parents/guardians an opportunity to grant permission for their son or daughter to participate in a class or to request an alternative assignment when study materials are deemed controversial. Parents/guardians with concerns regarding controversial issues, materials, and curricula should contact the school's principal.



CAFETERIA LUNCH PRE-PAY SYSTEM

John Hersey High School's Food Service Department is now using [myLunchMoney.com](https://www.myLunchMoney.com), a new secure service, to prepay for your student's breakfast, lunch and a la carte purchases in the school cafeteria using your credit card. To enroll, go to <https://www.myLunchMoney.com> and click "register for an account" and follow the prompts to set up your student's account. You can also enroll by phone by calling toll free 1-800-479-3531. There is a fee for using this service each time you deposit money in your student's account. For more information on using this service, please contact Christine Frole, Food Service Supervisor, 847-718-7639.

You can still utilize the prepay system by sending a check or cash to the Cafeteria Office along with a completed prepayment form. You may also find the Prepay FAQ page on the next page for more information on establishing and using prepaid accounts.

CAFETERIA LUNCH PRE-PAY SYSTEM

Use the following process

The Food Services Department of District 214 has a computerized debit system in our schools that allows parents to prepay for school food services. This system also allows students eligible for free or reduced price meal benefits to obtain their benefits by bringing their student identification card to the cafeteria during meal services. This computerization provides many benefits for students and parents in utilizing the cafeteria services. Please review the following information to aid you in better understanding this program.

How does the prepaid system work?

The computerized system uses the student I.D. card to allow parents to establish a prepaid account for their students. The account may be used for breakfast, lunch and snack service. Students eligible for free or reduced-price meals will also use their I.D. card for school meals. At the end of the cafeteria line, after the student has selected his/her meal choices, he/she will need to present the student identification card to the cashier.

What are the advantages of the prepaid system?

Payment can be made by check or credit card on a weekly or monthly basis instead of giving your student cash for meals. This system is convenient for parents and students. The prepayment system will provide faster service to students while helping students develop budget skills. Parents can also monitor what their students are purchasing regardless of payment method.

How is the prepaid account established?

There are several ways to establish a prepaid account for your students.

By check or cash - To establish a prepaid account for your student, a form may be picked up in the school cafeteria or can be printed from this site. Complete the form and send it with cash or a check payable to your student's school cafeteria. A completed form must accompany all payments.

NEW - By credit card – To set up an online account at myLunchMoney.com, go to <https://www.myLunchMoney.com> and click on “enroll now”. Follow the instructions given to set up your student's account. For assistance in setting up or using an account, contact the myLunchMoney.com support team at 1-800-479-3531.

How long does it take to post funds to a prepaid account?

Payments made using checks or cash will be credited to your student's account by the next business day.

Payments made using credit cards at myLunchMoney.com are generally credited to your student's account within 24 hours.

Is there a fee to use the online system?

Yes. In addition to the amount of funds deposited in your student's account, a convenience fee of \$1.95 will be added to your credit card for each deposit made per site. If you have more than one student in the same school, you will be charged only one fee of \$1.95 if funds are deposited into each of your students' accounts during the same transaction session.

What cards are accepted for online prepayment?

Both Visa and Master Card credit cards are accepted as forms of payment.

How safe is my credit card information?

Information is stored with the myLunchMoney.com website. To ensure the protection of all information stored on the website, all online transactions for myLunchMoney are handled with industry standard SSL encryption certified by Verisign. Additional detailed information can be found on the myLunchMoney.com home page.

What happens when a prepaid account reaches a zero balance?

The food service cashier will alert a student when the balance is at or below \$3.00. No credit will be extended. Students with a zero balance must pay cash for their meals until their account is reestablished. Students may ask for the status of their account balance from a cashier any time a transaction is made in the cafeteria. If you are using the online system, you will be notified by e-mail when your student's account is low.

Can students charge meals with their student I.D.?

No. This is not a credit system designed to develop a bill or be paid at a later date.

Can students receive refunds?

Regardless of the method of payment, refunds of unused funds will be made by district check to parents only upon written request. Cash refunds will not be made to students. Unused funds will carry over to the next school year for returning students. Parents can also request in writing to have unused balances transferred to another District 214 sibling.

How much does school meal service cost?

An average student can expect to spend \$2.75 to \$4.00 per day for lunch. Breakfast is also available for \$1.25.

Dear Arlington Heights Parents,

My name is Cathy McQuillan. I am a retired Dist. 25 teacher and a resident of Arlington Heights. Currently, I am serving on the **Arlington Heights 125 Anniversary** Committee as a school liaison. We are planning the activities to commemorate next year's 125th anniversary of our Village's incorporation.

While our celebration will be highlighting many aspects of Arlington Heights history, growth, and future, we are emphasizing the role of the railroad in our village. The expansion of the train tracks along Northwest Highway played a huge part in the development of Arlington Heights. That is why we are featuring a train engine in our logo design and in many activities.

We are very excited to offer **the purchase of fiberglass train engines** (Approx. 2 1/2' X 4') that can be painted, decorated, and then displayed around the Village all next summer(You may remember the Ponies on Parade of years ago). Since each engine costs \$995, I wanted to encourage groups of families in getting together and sharing the cost. For example, if 10 families purchased a train engine, it would cost each family \$99.50. Then you could have your child or class, team, club, group of friends decorate that engine for display. **WOULDN'T THAT BE MEMORABLE?** Once the display time has ended, you could consider donating the engine to your school for auction. They would keep the proceeds and you would get a deduction on your 2012 taxes. The deadline for ordering an engine is Nov. 1.



We are also offering the chance of **purchasing a large street banner** which will fly for 14 months on a village light pole. Our Quasquicentennial (125 years) logo will be featured on it, as well as a name.(for example: The Jones Family or North School). This is another opportunity for you to work with other families in buying one for your street, neighborhood, school, class, team, club, or family. **IMAGINE YOUR BANNER BEING SEEN BY EVERYONE!** This banner costs \$500; but, again, if shared by 10 families, it comes to \$50 a family. As we want to order these by our kick-off in November, we need your reservation by the end of Sept.

Just to let you know of other plans, a commemorative 2012 calendar will be on sale for \$20 beginning at the Nov. tree lighting ceremony. A recycled glass logo sun catcher will sell for \$15. These items are being offered at cost. This celebration is not a money making venture for the Village. We are currently funded by sponsors and administrated by an all volunteer committee.
